AROUND THE POND

Senior class project completed



The 2007 senior class eco-plaza project is complete. With grants from the Iowa Department of Natural Resources, and Heartland Resource, Conservation and Development, donations from the senior class and a matching gift from Barry Griswell, chairman and chief executive officer of The Principal Financial Group,

Central was able to install the plaza southwest of Jordan Hall.

The plaza features storm water conservation practices such as permeable concrete block pavers, meadow and perennial plantings, a drip irrigation system, a seating area and the campus's first outdoor recycling center.

"Each year the senior class chooses a project," said Anna Bates, director of the Central Fund. "This year's gift was especially unique since it put into practice the students' studies in a common freshman course titled Human Impact in the Global Environment. The project was education in action."

HANSEN SELECTED TO TEACH IN AUSTRIA

Brittney Hansen of Indianola, a May Central College graduate, is one of 145 students nationwide who was selected as a U.S. foreign language teaching assistant at Austrian Secondary Schools, a program administrated by the Fulbright Commission in cooperation with the Austrian Ministry of Education, the Arts and Culture.

Funded primarily by direct contributions from U.S. and Austrian governments, the Fulbright Program provides grants for U.S. citizens, who are recent graduates, graduate students, scholars and professionals, to study, teach or pursue research in Austria. Austrian citizens engage in similar activities in the United States.

Hansen will teach English at Hohere Bundeslehranstalt und Bundesamt für Wein- und Obstbau, a specialized institute for higher education that focuses on fruit and wine farming in Klosterneuburg, Austria, just north of Vienna, where she studied for a semester through Central's study abroad program.

Hansen's term began Oct. 1 and will end May 30. She graduated with a bachelor's degree in elementary education and German studies.

CENTRAL REACHES ENROLLMENT GOAL

For the eighth time in 10 years, Central College has an incoming class of first-year students totaling over 400. Central officially has 424 first-time freshmen.

With 1,605 students enrolled for the 2007-08 academic year, Central College continues to exceed 1,600 students for the seventh consecutive year. Central has 1,575 full-time students and 53 part-time students.

The 1,605 students are comprised of 739 males and 866 females representing 38 states and 16 countries. The number of minority, international and non-Iowa resident students continues to increase.

ROE SIGNS CAMPUS CLIMATE COMMITMENT

President David Roe signed the American Colleges and University Presidents' Campus Climate Commitment. Central committed to sharply reducing and eventually eliminating all the college's global warming emissions and accelerating research and educational efforts to help society re-stabilize the earth's climate. "It's our responsibility to address the issues our world is facing," said Roe.



HAMMOND RECEIVES ROTARY SCHOLARSHIPS

Central College senior Michael Hammond, a history and Spanish major from Boone, Iowa, is a recipient of the Rotary Foundation's Ambassadorial Scholarship. Hammond received \$25,000 to complete his graduate education at a foreign institution of his choice.

This program is mutually beneficial as scholars are given the opportunity to serve as ambassadors of goodwill to the people of the host country. Then, scholars return home to share with Rotarians and others what they have experienced.

Hammond has studied abroad twice including a semester each in Granada, Spain, and London, England.

Whisner, Bollard receive NCAA academic honors

For the second consecutive year, two Central College athletes were awarded NCAA postgraduate scholarships.

Track and field all-America honorees Ben Bollard of Pella and Alicia Whisner of Adel were honored. Both will receive \$7,500 for postgraduate study. Central was the only Iowa college or university with a scholarship recipient for the spring season. It's the fourth straight year that Central has produced an NCAA scholarship winner. Central has had 20 scholarship recipients since 1970.

There were 58 men's and women's spring sport recipients selected. The NCAA awards 174 postgraduate scholarships annually. To be eligible for selection, a student-athlete must have a cumulative grade point average of 3.2 or above, have performed with distinction in athletics, and behaved — both on and off the field — in a manner that brought credit to the student-athlete, the institution and intercollegiate athletics.

Whisner also was tabbed as one of 30 finalists for the NCAA Woman of the

Year Award. A four-time letterwinner and team captain in volleyball, Whisner was the NCAA Division III track and field champion in the women's javelin last spring. She graduated with a 3.92 grade point average as an exercise science major.

It's the fifth time in the past seven years that Central's nominee for the Woman of the Year Award has been chosen as the lone college and university representative from Iowa. Selection is based on service and leadership activities,

academic achievement, athletics excellence and a personal statement. Whisner joined the other finalists at an awards dinner in Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 27.

Bollard became the first Central athlete to receive CoSIDA Academic All-America distinction in two sports. He was a second-team honoree in track and field after being a first-team choice in football. He graduated with a 3.78 GPA as a computer science major.

Bollard received all-America honors in track and field four times, once in the 400-meter hurdles last spring and three times in the 4x400 meter relay. He was a team co-captain, a four-time letterwinner and captured the Iowa Conference decathlon crown in May.

Bollard was also a three-time letterwinner in football. He was an all-Iowa Conference and all-West Region performer and was named to the Division III all-star team to play in the Aztec Bowl in Mexico.

ACADEMIC AWARDS

For the seventh straight year, the Central College volleyball team received the Game Plan/AVCA Team Academic Award which was announced earlier this fall.

It's the eighth time the Dutch captured the academic honor which requires that the team's combined grade point average for the preceding year be maintained at 3.30 or above (4.0 scale).

Coaches Association's All-Academic Team. To qualify for the honor squad, an athlete must have a cumulative GPA of 3.25 or better and an NCAA national meet-qualifying mark.

Cited were Bollard, Whisner, junior sprinter Guy Dierikx of Port Byron, Ill., freshman middle-distance runner Alex Miller of Van Meter, senior distance runner Adam Wolf of Corning, Cody Huisman of Mason City, Rachel Boeke of Cedar Rapids, freshman distance runner Angie Berry of Norwalk, senior thrower Chelsey Keller of Fairfield and junior heptathlete Kari Hutchinson of Charles City.

Three Central men's golfers were picked for the Cleveland Golf All-America Scholars for Division III by the Golf Coaches Association of America. Senior Jeff Millet of Newton, senior Isaac Rodenberg of Elkader and junior Reid Turner of Des Moines were recognized.

To be eligible for selection, a player must be a junior or senior, participate in at least 70 percent of the team's competitive rounds or compete in the NCAA championship tournament, have a stroke average of 79.0 or better and a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.20.

Five Central athletes from head track and field coach Kevin Sanger's squad were also tabbed for the women's academic squad, which was announced earlier. The 10 athletes honored are a record total for the Dutch, whose previous high was eight academic team members in 2002.

All-America honorees Bollard, Dierikx and Miller head the list. Also honored were Wolf, an NCAA Division III meet qualifier in cross country, and Huisman.

- The recently renovated football field and track at the Ron and Joyce Schipper stadium were dedicated at the first home football game. The \$2.8 million project included a new FieldTurf football playing surface and a 400-meter eight-lane full-pour polyurethane track.
- ▶ The A Cappella Choir, Alumni Choir and Symphonic Wind Ensemble gave a tribute concert in honor of the retirement of David Williams, professor emeritus of music, during the inaugural combined Homecoming/Family Weekend.







October

- ▶ Central was named to Barron's ninth edition of *Best Buys in College Education*, a tool for students and parents seeking first-rate education at an affordable price.
- Six-hundred and seventy-seven students participated in Central's annual CROPWALK by donating meals for a day to help fight hunger. The cost of their meals, which totaled \$5,551.40, was donated with 25 percent going to the Pella Food Shelf and 75 percent to the national and international CROPWALK efforts.
- ▶ Central was one of 99 institutions named to the first President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll for distinguished general community service in recognition of extraordinary volunteer efforts by the school and its students to serve area neighborhoods and communities.

November

▶ Central collected 650 items to donate to the Salvation Army of Southeastern Iowa in Ottumwa for its third annual food drive, sponsored by student activities.

December

- Biology professor Russ Benedict and wife Mary, advancement database coordinator, took 15 students in his tropical ecology class on a 16-day trip during Central's winter break to Belize and Costa Rica. The group explored the second largest Barrier Reef and studied various tropical forests.
- Central's dance team competed in Iowa's State Dance Team Association competition and received Division I ratings in both the Jazz and Pom categories and placed second overall.
- Students and employees donated 340 toys for Toys for Tots for children in Marion County.







<u>January</u>

- ▶ President David Roe signed the Talloires Declaration of the Association of University Leaders for a Sustainable Future. The Talloires Declaration is a 10-point action plan for incorporating sustainability and environ-mental literacy in teaching, research, operations and outreach at colleges and universities.
- ▶ Central underwent an on-site Quality Check-Up as part of its participation in the Academic Quality Improvement Program by a team representing The Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Central has been accredited by the commission since 1942 at the bachelor's degree level.
- ▶ Central hosted an international alumni reception at the college's house in Merida, Mexico, honoring retired Merida director George Ann Huck and Armando Baquiero Cardenas '70, who received an honorary degree in May 2006.
- ▶ Central College Abroad extended the Merida, Mexico, study abroad program offerings by partnering with additional local universities in Merida. President David Roe signed cooperative agreements with Marista University, Modelo University and the Universidad Autonoma de Yucatan.

▶ President David Roe received an award from the Zeta Kappa Lambda Educational Foundation Inc.'s Champions of Change, a scholarship program created by the fraternity in Des Moines.

March

▶ Thirteen students traveled to Biloxi, Miss., during spring break with campus ministries to help with hurricane-relief projects at Camp Biloxi.

April

- ▶ Approximately 900 Central College students, employees and alumni participated in Central's second annual Community Service Day, helping with over 70 projects in Pella and surrounding areas.
- ▶ Eleven American literature seminar students and Josh Dolezal, assistant professor of English, traveled to Lincoln, Neb., to study at the Willa Cather Archive at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln.
- ▶ The board of trustees approved plans for a new \$17 million, 54,000-square-foot education and psychology building.

May

- ▶ Central said goodbye to 311 graduates, who participated in the commencement ceremony in H.S. Kuyper Fieldhouse May 13. Des Moines business leader Ted Townsend, owner and president of Townsend Vision Inc., gave the keynote address.
- ▶ The Symphonic Wind Ensemble and Jazz Band toured London and Paris, performing concerts at Morley College and Union Chapel in London.
- ▶ Central was the only Iowa college of 58 colleges and universities across the nation recognized for service-learning programs in the inaugural edition of the *Guide to Service-Learning Colleges and Universities*.

June

- ▶ Four Central faculty members retired this year after collectively serving the college for 137 years. Those retiring included Gary Boeyink, associate professor of exercise science; Robin Martin, associate professor of library science and director of Geisler Library; James Schultze, associate professor of psychology; and Louise Zaffiro, professor of chemistry.
- ▶ Central hosted nearly 600 delegates, official guests, chaplains and denominational executives on campus at the 201st session of the Reformed Church in America General Synod.
- Nine students received Central's new Reformed Church in America (RCA) Classis Scholarship, a renewable \$5,000 scholarship for each of the RCA classes for first-year RCA students.

D O N O REPORT

The Campaign for Central Phase II

Two years into Phase II of the Campaign for Central, the college has raised 80 percent of its goal since July 1, 1999, when the campaign kicked off. The total through June 30 for the Campaign for Central was \$68,712,765, while the goal remains \$86,000,000.

THROUGH JUNE 30

RECORD NUMBER OF LARGE GIFTS

Central received a record number of large cash gifts during the 2006-07 fiscal year. A gift of over \$2 million led the way. In addition, there were 17 gifts of \$100,000 and up and 62 gifts from \$10,000 to \$95,000. The gifts established scholarships, funded capital projects and provided support to the Central Fund.

Central also received a \$1 million pledge from Barry and Michele Griswell to fund the psychology wing of Central's planned \$17-million education and psychology building.

MAYTAG STUDENT CENTER RENOVATIONS

Central received a \$500,000 gift from the F Maytag Family Foundation for improvements to the Maytag Student Center, named in honor of Fred Maytag II. Maytag was made possible largely due to the generosity of the foundation in the 1980s and is the main center for students. The gift funded three capital improvement needs, which included an extended stairwell to the lower level in the atrium, a new roof and new carpet throughout the facility.

DENEKAS ESTATE

Central was given over \$2,050,000 from the Marvin "Mike" Denekas estate. One million of that gift went to establish the Ruth and Marvin Denekas Endowed Chair in Science and Humanities which recognizes a Central College faculty member who has demonstrated exemplary teaching and scholarship, and the ability to cross disciplinary boundaries. The remainder of the estate went to support the Rev. Wolbert and Matilda Denekas Scholarship.

Mark Johnson, professor of mathematics and computer science, was named the first endowed chair recipient last October. Johnson's contributions to the development of Intersections, a required first-year experience course, were essential to its current success and represents his commitment to interdisciplinary liberal arts education. He shifted his disciplinary focus from mathematics to computer science to help advance the development of the computational science major.

REYNENS GIVE \$1 MILLION TO FUND BUTLER CHAIR

Last fall, John '59 and Judy Reynen gave a \$1 million gift to endow the Donald T. Butler Chair in Economics at Central. The Reynens sold three parcels of land in Sacramento, Calif., and gave additional funds to the college for the \$1 million gift. The late Butler was a professor of economics at Central from 1953-95.

PLANNING FOR TAXES

Every gift makes a difference — whether providing a scholarship, supporting the Central Fund or helping build something new. For many donors, the gift also makes a difference in an individual's tax burden.

The late Orville '33 and Ermina Dunn Dykstra '35, of Walnut Creek, Calif., have provided tremendous support to Central. Consistent givers since 1972, the Dykstras endowed a scholarship in 2000.

This past year, Ermina chose to make another lasting impact on Central and make a difference in her tax consequences. Her gift of \$400,000 was designated to Central's new education and psychology building, naming a large classroom in the education wing.





reflects total giving reflects bequests received






